President's Report Year 28

THIS AIC NEWSLETTER is the second of the four expected between the two Plenary AIC Sessions: in Budapest (1993) and Kyoto (1997). As in the 1994 Newsletter, first of all I would like to congratulate the AIC Executive Committee Members and the Chairmen of the Study Groups for their uninterrupted effort in fulfilling their tasks, in excellent mutual harmony.

The AIC is fast approaching the end of its third decade. Its success is undoubtedly owing to the continued presence of outstanding personalities managing at the top. My self-consciousness has indicated to me the most appropriate way of going on: to continue to profit from the high level of past expertise, thereby benefitting its future leaders.

Accordingly, the AIC Midterm Meeting in Berlin (3-6 September, 1995), organized by AIC President emeritus **Dr. Heinz Terstiege** (who was awarded the *Judd/AIC Gold Medal* on this occasion), provided a bridge between classical and advanced colorimetry.

The past-President, **Dr. Alan Robertson**, who kindly contributed in various ways during the first year of the current quadrennium, has been inspiring also in the second year, in that I made a personal effort to pursue an initiative started by him with the co-operation of **Dr. Allan Rodrigues**: to encourage communication among the AIC Member Organizations and Observers, even beyond the occasion of annual AIC Meetings. Through the creation of subgroups of the AIC Study Groups, and with the co-operation of its Chairmen, several authoritative experts agreed to revise the draft Reports for speedy pre-processing. It would take too long to include all their names here; but they are globally acknowledged. I limit myself to citing the organizer of the AIC Congress in Budapest and past-EC Member, **Dr. Antal Nemcsics**. Moreover, I would like to acknowledge a proposal of another past-EC Member, **Mr. Paul Green-Armytage**: to utilize the Internet to evaluate on a worldwide scale the definitions of specialist terms of interest that have been the outcomes of the activity of a subgroup of the Environmental Colour Design Study Group. This will be an AIC task for the near-future, just waiting for the availability of this facility, and for the "motivated" student.

Vice-President **Prof. Mitsuo Ikeda** gave envigoration to the organization of the AIC 1997 Congress, to be held in Kyoto (23-30 May, 1997): two announcements have already been sent out; the latter, also distributed at the CIE Plenary Session in New Delhi (1-8 November, 1995), is particularly attractive for both its content and its appearance, its cover rich in promising "warm" colours, and surely rich in symbolic meaning. The distribution of tasks among members of the Kyoto Organisating Committee guarantees a successful outcome.

Secretary/Treasurer Dr. Kees van Trigt is pursuing his invaluable contribution, representing the backbone or substrate of the AIC.

Let me now consider the Ordinary Members of the Executive Committee, in alphabetical order:-

Ms. Paula Alessi is engaged in various tasks: in addition to representing the AIC within the CIE, she is working to establish, evaluate, and preserve liaisons between the AIC and various organizations interested in colour; additionally, she has initiated a world-wide enquiry concerning Colour

Education at post-elementary level, with a view to future co-ordination of various initiatives; she is also issuing a statement describing the AIC goals and its activities.

Mr. Roy Osborne has been contributing to various Study Group subgroups (mainly in colour and art) and has been patiently revising the English language draft Reports of some of the subgroups. While editing the 1994 and 1995 Newsletters, he has been up-dating some points, and may liaise with Paula Alessi in the development of the Colour Education Study Group.

Mr. Frank Rochow has been very efficient, on the occasion of the AIC Midterm Meeting in Berlin, in assisting Prof. Terstiege.

Last but not least, **Dr. Lars Sivik**. There is a enthusiastic expectation as far as the AIC Interim Meeting in Gothenburg (Göteborg) is concerned, (15-18 June, 1996), and Sweden is a an appropriate place to tackle the psychological aspects of colour, owing to the high level of interest in this subject demonstrated by the Swedish Colour Group. Just a few words to illustrate the complexity of the matter: in Budapest (1993), Dr Sivik had in mind a meeting on "Colour Meaning", next converted into "Colour and Psychology", but virtually modified into "Colour beyond Psychophysics" (see, for example, one of the ISCC Newsletters), or even "Colour and Psychology beyond Psychophysics" (see, for instance, the last issue of the Colour Society of Australia Newsletter), but in Berlin (1995), he confirmed the title finally chosen: "Colour in Psychology".

Finally, I would like to comment on the ongoing AIC Study Groups:-

Study Group on Colour Education. Chairman **Dr. Erik Melse**. The conclusion has been reached that the studies of Colour Education at elementary level have practically reached a "dead" point; Dr Melse completed a list of addresses of interested persons. In the meantime, Paula Alessi is performing an orientating enquiry into post-elementary Colour Education, and a number of draft Reports for various subgroups have been issued and pre-processed. Additionally, an invitation for an AIC Midterm Meeting in 1999, exclusively on the topic of Colour Education, has been proposed by the Korea Society of Color Study.

Study Group on Environmental Colour Design (ECD). Chairman Dr. Leonhard Oberascher is expected to chair a Symposium in Gothenburg, and an ECD Symposium in Kyoto is planned for the 21st century. Various subgroups have been activated within the ECD and draft Reports are available on diskette.

Study Group on Visual Illusions and Effects. Chairman Prof. Osvaldo da Pos is expected to chair two Symposia, one in Gothenburg and the other in Kyoto. Subgroup activities are in a fairly advanced state, and Reports are available on diskette.

The New Year Season recommends very best greetings to you all. With many thanks, again, for your kind and valuable co-operation.

AIC Executive Committee Meeting Sunday, 3 September, 1995, 10.00-17.30, 1995

at BAM, Unter den Eichen 44-46, Berlin, Germany

Members present: Dr Lucia Ronchi (President and Chair), Dr. Kees van Trigt (Sectretary/Treasurer) and Miss Paula Alessi, Mr. Frank Rochow, and Dr. Lars Sivik (Ordinary Members). Apologies for absence were received from Prof. Mitsuo Ikeda and Mr. Roy Osborne.

- 1. Welcoming address. Dr. Ronchi welcomed members of the Executive Committee (EC). Thanks to the hospitality of Dr. Heinz Terstiege, the AIC Midterm Meeting is held in Berlin.
- 2. Approval of Agenda: approved.
- 3. Approval of Minutes of the Previous AIC EC Meeting; approved.
- 4. Revision of selected paragraphs of the AIC Statutes. Decision was deferred, owing to the absence of Mr. Osborne.
- 5. Financial Report by the Secreatry/Treasurer. Dr. van Trigt presented the Reports of both auditors, along with the Financial Report, which was approved. He also presented the (approved) Report of auditor Jan Walraven concerning the 1993 Financial Report, which was not available at the previous EC Meeting in Cambridge, England.

The AIC's financial position is healthy; and funds are growing. Because the recipient of the AIC /Judd Award, Dr. Terstiege, works in Berlin, it is not necessary to outlay travel expenses this year.

- The Canadian Society for Colour has been expelled, owing to continued failure to pay subscription fee; see also 7. A similar situation arises now with respect to the Centre Information de la Couleur Belgique, which has once again been invited to pay.
- 6. Liaisons with international organizations. Miss Alessi will represent the AIC within the CIE, and take care that information of mutual interest, for example, regarding the Newsletter, is exchanged.
- 7. AIC Membership. In addition to the points mentioned in 5: applications for membership as AIC Observers have been received, welcomed and accepted from Dr. Alan Robertson (Canada), Mr. Teruo Nil (Hong Kong), and Dr. Stephen Coonan (Ireland), effective from 1 January, 1996. The EC is delighted to welcome the Korea Society of Color Study.
- 8. AIC Newsletter. The 1995 Newsletter will be prepared by Mr. Osborne in December, 1995, and mailed to Member Organizations and Observers in mid-January, 1996.
- 9. AIC Study Groups (ongoing and new). Both the Environmental Colour Design (ECD) and Visual Illusions and Effects Study Groups are preparing their Reports. The ECD Chair is Dr Leonhard Oberascher, Institut fur Angewandte Okologische Psychologie, Kaltnergasse 8, A-5020 Salzburg, Austria. The Visual Illusions Chair is Prof. Osvaldo da Pos, Department of General Psychology, Via Venezia 8, 35131 Padova, Italy. The attempt to establish a Virtual Reality Study Group by Mr. Rochow (1994) was unsuccessful, his call in the AIC Newsletter stimulating very little response.

In the last few years, *Machine Vision* has shown developments of interest for colour science. Papers on the subject appear in journals less accessible to our many of our members. An AlC Study Group on *Machine Vision*, comprising a different range of people promising, for example, to exchange articles, could be worthwhile. Since the main developments are in the United States, Miss Alessi will contact potential members and IEEE. It is emphasized again that Study Groups may receive financial support from the AlC for covering postage costs, etc., if that Group has presented a Report concerning its activities in the last year to the EC. Formal requests are to be sent in writing, by letter, to the AlC Secretary/Treasurer.

- 10. Tutorial courses. It has been emphasized repeatedly by the present Secretary/Treasurer that the AIC should balance income and expenditure in the sense that the present funds are large. Money should be used for the purposed for which the AIC was established. Accordingly, the EC has agreed to consider the possibility of organizing tutorial courses on the occasion of AIC meetings, details of which can be discussed with meeting organizers and with the EC itself.
- 11. Publication of AIC Study Group Reports. Covered in 9.
- 12. Proceedings of the AIC 1995 Midterm Meeting. These will be published in Die Farbe. It is proposed that those of the 1996 Interim meeting will also be published in Die Farbe.
- 13. Future Meetings. The next AIC Interim Meeting, Colour and Psychology, is in Gothenburg (Göteborg) in Sweden, 15-18 June, 1996. For information, contact Prof. Lars Sivik, Kullaviks Skogsväg 4, S-42935 Kullavik, Sweden (fax +46-31-431 012).

Preparation for the next AIC Congress, *Color 97*, in Kyoto (25-30 May, 1997), is well underway. For information, contact the Secretariat, c/o JTB Communications, New Kyoto Center Building, 5F Shiokoji Shinmachi, Shimogyo-ku, Kyoto 600, Japan (fax +81-75-341-1917).

The AIC is receiving various invitations, in the matter of Interim meetings in the next quadrennium. This is the case, for instance, of the Colour Group of Bulgaria and the Korea Society for Color Study. The invitations will be evaluated at the next EC Meeting.

- 14. The Judd/AIC Award. The recipient of the Deane B. Judd/AIC Award is Dr. Heinz Terstiege. The Award will be presented to him in the morning session of the Meeting, on Tuesday, 5 September. New nominations for the Judd/AIC Award (in 1997) will not be explicitly solicited, since insufficient nominations were received in 1994. Not all nominations were accompanied by a curriculum vitae. Dr. Ronchi will gather together nominations early in 1996.
- 15. The EC in the next quadrennium. Since Prof. Ikeda is to succeed Dr. Ronchi as President (on 1 January, 1998), and the present Secretary/Treasurer will be resigning, a new Vice-President and a new Secretary/Treasurer will need to be nominated, in addition to four Ordinary Committee Members. Mr. Rochow has expressed willingness to take over the role of Secretary/Treasurer. The topic will be considered further at the next EC Meeting (June 1996).
- 16. Next EC Meeting: Saturday, 15 June, 1996, Gothenburg. Location to be determined by Dr. Sivik.
- 17. Those in attendance were thanked by Dr. Ronchi, who closed the Meeting.

THE COLOUR SOCIETY OF AUSTRALIA

The major event for the Colour Society during 1995 was our fifth biennial conference. This was held at the Australian Chamber of Manufacturers Conference Centre in Melbourne, and was organized jointly by the Colour Society and Colourways Australia, the colour marketing group of the Design Institute of Australia. For each session of the conference there was a theme: Advances in Colour Technology; Colour in Design; Colour Perception; Colour and the Environment; Colour in Education; Colour Order and Colour Specifying Systems. The afternoon of the second day was devoted to a Colour Imaging Seminar during which current problems were discussed and the latest technology was presented.

Our principal sponsor was the Collie Trust, whose generous support enabled us to welcome Prof. Roy Berns as keynote speaker both for the Conference and for the Colour Imaging Seminar. Other major sponsors were Apple Computers, Dulux Australia and Fuji-Xerox. Roy spoke about *Advances in Colour Measurement*. He referred to the ease with which colour measurements can now be carried out, but the focus of his talk was the fundamental limitations that remain. He described current innovations such as the CIE94 colour-difference equation and the use of statistical tools to derive colour tolerances. To introduce the Colour Imaging Seminar he described the particular problems of the graphic reproduction industry in ensuring accuracy and the work being done at the Munsell Color Science Laboratory to overcome these problems.

We were fortunate to have two other visitors from overseas. In the session devoted to *Colour in Design*, Dale Russell presented a lively talk on *The Paradox of Colour*, and Roy Osborne spoke on *Colour in Graphics*. Roy also contributed a paper on *Colour and Form in Education*. We were fortunate that both Dale and Roy were able to include Sydney and Perth in their itineraries. Dale attended the workshop conducted by Colourways which followed the conference and was able to give the group the benefit of her experience as Creative Director of the Colour Group affiliated to the Chartered Society of Designers, UK. She also address a large audience in Perth on the topic *Colour in Design - How? Why? When?* Both she and Roy Osborne visited schools of Design in Melbourne and Sydney and both contributed to the programmes of the School of Design, Curtin University in Western Australia. Roy had a working "holiday" for two weeks as a visiting teaching fellow at Curtin. His visit added a valuable new dimension to my own colour programme.

There were many other highlights at the conference, new information and new insights in the major areas of colour interest. One area that seems likely to attract increasing attention in the future is colour and the environment. Stuart McDiarmid spoke about the environmental considerations in the choice of colourants and the possible reduction in the range of colours available to designers as the more harmful colorants are banned. He suggested ways in which designers could turn what might appear to be a problem into an opportunity. A new approach to colour in the cotton industry was presented by Heather Ball and John Carlyle, who described the Corella Project. Cotton occurs naturally in a surprisingly wide range of colours besides white. The beautiful Corella colour range is achieved without dyes and includes brown, cream, beige and shades of olive—green. Potentially more startling is the objective of Florigene. John Mason gave an account of the long quest for the blue rose. Apparently roses, carnations, and crysanthemums account for over half the cut flower sales world-wide but there are no blue varieties. Of the other cut flowers sold, the most popular colour is blue. Genetic engineering promises to make the blue rose a reality and we can expect blue carnations to be available in our local flower shops quite soon!

The social programme was as lively as ever. We had the particular good fortune that the conference was held while there was a major exhibition of work by Matisse at the National Gallery of Victoria. A private view of the exhibition and a cocktail party at the gallery was an ideal way to set the colour mood.

Contribution to the AIC Annual Newsletter 1995

Few years ago, within the Faculty of Architecture of the Slovak Technical University. Department of Visual Studies, an initiative was born for introducing selected aspects of colour science into the curriculum of architectural studies as a separate subject. A small team was set up to evaluate the existing situation in practice and tuition, to draw together specialists dealing with any aspect of this science on national level, and to establish contacts with experts and centres abroad. Although the team was based at the Faculty of Architecture, its members were also external specialists: A. Vranka - architect; S. Katuscak - chemist; A. Urlandova - architect; O. Varakozo - artist. National institutions and specialists (existing as well as potentially interested ones) were identified and contacted, consulted in the process. First international activities were taken: a conference with contributions by W. Spillmann (Switzerland) and O.da Pos (Italy) was organized at the Faculty of Architecture, G. Schilling (Germany), L. Sivik (Sweden) and A. Nemcsics (Hungary) were also invited for selected occasions. A first doctoral dissertation involving this subject was completed successfully in 1994 and a specific research project concluded in 1993. Collaboration with specialists and specialized institutions abroad was developed in terms of common research projects, consultancy, and preparation of didactic materials, participation in international conferences.

In 1991 the curriculum of the subject "Colour science" was drafted and approved, and in 1992 the subject was experimentally introduced into the study programme of the Faculty of Architecture for the 6th semester, involving lectures as well as practical sessions. In 1993 the subject was, upon request, taught also at the Faculty of Civil Engineering for students of the 7th semester. The Academic year 1993/94 allowed further development of the concept: with lecturers and practical sessions introducing relevant theoretical aspects in the 4th semester and applications to architecture and design dealt with in the 5th semester. The entry of J. Bartko - artist/educator into the team was a valuable enrichment. In the academic year 1994/95 the collaboration with the Faculty of Civil Engineering was successfully continued, providing the subject of "Colour Science" for students of the 5th semester with lectures and practical sessions.

The first semester of the Academic year 1995/96 has been concluded, having taught the subject to students of the 5th semester at the Faculty of Architecture. For those interested in further study its optional choice will be offered.

In the current process of reviewing the structure and curricula at the Faculty of Architecture in the overall Technical University context, the phases of development and refining have not finished for this newly established subject and we hope to be able to continuously improve it, backing all our efforts with adequate research, setting up of an appropriate laboratory in accordance with the trends and development of knowledge in the field and by keeping our contacts and collaboration with existing study centres, individual experts and institutions vivid.

AIC Study-Group on Visual Illusions and Effects

Why this study group.

- The term "illusion" is traditionally used by a variety of researchers in many fields of visual sciences.
- Optical Illusions and Effects are considered since long by psychologists and visual scientists, and are also used in many practical applications. The literature is very wide and spread in a number of publications.

The AIC is a non-profit organisation with the object of encouraging colour research in all its aspects, of disseminating the knowledge gained from research, and promoting its application to solutions of problems in the field of science, art, design, and industry on an international basis.

THE MAIN THEME of this conference is

Colour and Psychology.

We know that many people around the world are interested in colour and many questions are asked about colours, not least their psychological correlates. As colours, as they appear, are perceptions – which only exist in our heads – one can actually say that colour is psychology. Central topics, thus, are colour appearance, including the phenomenology of colour and colour differences, colour dimensions, transparency, colour "illusions", appearance changes due to distance, lighting and other conditions. But colours also carry symbolic meaning which may vary between different cultures. Colour preferences may be individual – but if there were no consensus between people there would be no need for colour designers!. Are colours related to certain moods, personality traits, etc.? Are there any differences between connotative and physiological responses? How do we talk about colours, do we name them in the same way? Are we affected by colours in the environment? How is colour used in literature?

REGISTRATION FEES

The fee for delegates is SEK 2.700 (appr. 370 USD) if paid before 1st April, thereafter the fee will be 2.900. 

AIC to Liaise with Other International Organizations Dealing with Colour

The AIC statues state that the AIC shall "aim for a close co-operation with existing international organizations, such as, for example, the International Commission on Illumination, the International Standards Organization, and the International Commission for Optics, in so far as colour is concerned. The AIC will not, however, duplicate the work of these bodies nor attempt to take over any of their responsibilities." I have been charged by our President, Professor Dr. Lucia Ronchi, to be a liaison to other international organizations that deal with colour.
